RACE AT CHORLEY.

RUNNER'S EXCITING EXPERIENCE IN LIMBRICK BROOK.

The biggest harriers' race contested at Chorley since pre-war days was decided on Saturday, when Chorley H. and A.C. entertained Leyland Motors A.C., Clayton H., and Rossendale H. in the third race in connection with the Mid-Lancashire Cross-country League for the Capt. M. et trophy.

Trail was laid by E. Pze! and R. Connelly, of the home club, over about 7½ miles along Market-street and Stump-street, crossing Eaves-lane, and across country over the Nab, returning by the Fever Hospital and along Walton-road.

Mr. J. Roscow, Chorley, started a muster of 50 runners who set a fast pace over the mile or so of roads before the country was reached, with the league leaders, Clayton H, holding a prominent position. The fast start had taken its toll, however, and the climb up the Nab proved a strenuous ordeal, and when the first man, A. Haydock, Clayton, closely followed by S. Beardsworth, Chorley, reached the top, the field was well strung out.

On the return journey the Motors' pack ran well

to score a surprise victory for team honours.

The contest for individual honours produced a great tussle in which D. Evans, the Oswaldtwistle runner of the Clayton pack, ran a well-judged race to arrive home first with a 30 yards lead over Haydock. His time was 45min. 15sec. A promising 17-year-old Chorley runner, S. Beardsworth, was a good third; L. Wright, Rossendale, was fourth: A. Blogg, Leyland, fifth; and J. Milnes, Leyland, sixth.
